

Greetings in the Name of the Crucified and Risen One, Jesus Christ!

Due to the late Easter, we began the season of Lent correspondingly late this year on March 2 with Ash Wednesday. As someone who came from a cold climate region, a late Easter was something of a treat because of the chance of better weather for Holy Week and The Great Three Days. There were no guarantees of better weather, though...

When I lived in Washington, D.C. for a semester of my theological studies in 1998, Easter was on April 12, and I recall it being a particularly beautiful day (summer-like by my standards); I spent that afternoon with my cousin and her husband at their home in Rockville, Maryland. After a nice dinner on the patio, we stepped inside and watched the final round of the Masters. Mark O'Meara won that year. (I had to look that up – sorry!)

Earlier that morning, my cousin and I attended Easter Sunday worship at St. Columba's Episcopal Church in Washington, D.C.; if anyone ever questions that, as a Lutheran, I had one foot in the Episcopal Church for twenty-five years, I can share a recollection like that! Many hours of that semester were spent at St. Columba's where I sang in the choir and up in Rockville where, among other things, I enjoyed gourmet cooking and lively conversation. Despite being 1,500 miles from home, I always had some kind of family or community to be a part of so I recall being homesick only rarely.

What makes memories like these from nearly a quarter century ago "stick" so well? I am sure that, given a moment, you could unearth similar memories. But in order for something to be *memorable*, it has to be particularly joyful, earthshattering, or tragic. What you had for dinner last Tuesday will be forgotten unless your dinner was something really special.

Remembrance obviously plays a huge role in our life and spirituality as a church. We are *constantly* remembering the ways God has acted throughout history and especially the pivotal events of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. In our liturgy, a typical Eucharistic Prayer contains a remembrance (Greek – *anamnesis*), which puts our celebration of the Eucharist into the larger context of the history of salvation. A favorite *anamnesis* of mine comes from the tradition of my upbringing, going back to Luther D. Reed's Prayer of Thanksgiving; the most recent version of the prayer says, "Remembering, therefore, his salutary command, his life-giving passion and death, his glorious resurrection and ascension, and the promise of his coming again, we give thanks to you, O Lord God Almighty, not as we ought but as we are able..."

A good *anamnesis* gives us everything worth remembering, and it should go without saying that we need to be reminded of what our Lord has done for us every time we gather for prayer, praise, and thanksgiving. For us, the things worth remembering are seen most vividly in the seasons of Lent and Easter, which flood us with elements of the joyful, earthshattering, and tragic, but these ultimately direct us to the victory over sin and death in the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ.

We remember things for a reason – whether an Easter afternoon in 1998 or the crucifixion, death, and resurrection of Jesus two thousand years ago. We remember them because they matter, and, especially

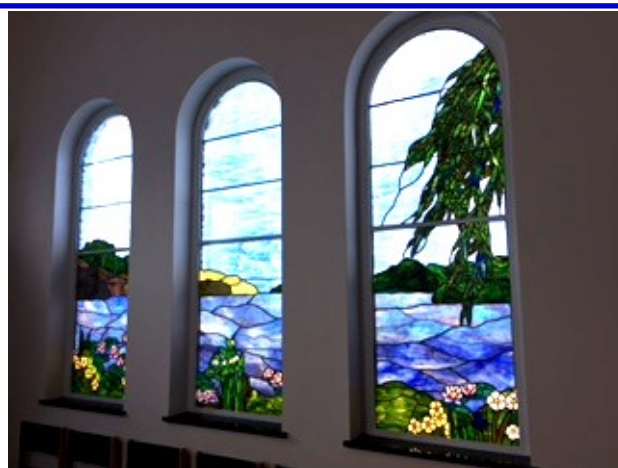

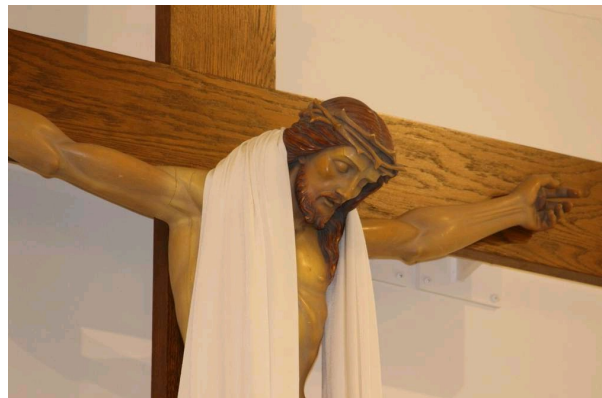

THE HOLIEST WEEK OF THE YEAR

Prayer for Easter Day

Almighty God, who through your only-begotten Son Jesus Christ overcame death and opened to us the gate of everlasting life: Grant that we, who celebrate with joy the day of the Lord's resurrection, may be raised from the death of sin by your life-giving Spirit; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Palm Sunday, April 10 at 8 or 10:15 a.m.

Join us for the Palm Procession into church, followed by our regular Sunday liturgy. We will meet in Rose Hall. This final Sunday of Lent, we focus on the "Passion" of our Lord, the spiritual, emotional and physical sufferings he endured the last week of his earthly life.

Maundy Thursday, April 14

The name "Maundy" derives from *mandatum novum*, Latin for "new commandment." On this night Jesus washed the feet of his disciples and instituted the sacrament of Holy Communion at the Last Supper. Our 7 p.m. service will include foot washing and the Holy Eucharist. After the service, we will begin our Vigil at the Altar of Repose. Parishioners will take turns waiting in the chapel throughout the night until 9 a.m. Good Friday. This is done as a symbolic re-enactment of the watch in the Garden of Gethsemane. Good Friday Confessions

On Good Friday, April 15, private confessions will be heard from 3-5 p.m. in the chapel. Why confess privately? What good will it do? When we repent, we come back into the light of God's love, which has always been there. If you feel a private confession will help you step back into the light of God's love, please come to the chapel on Good Friday afternoon. You will be heard, not judged, and prayed over.

Good Friday, April 15

The Day of the Crucifixion. In observance of this most sacred day, we ask that all who enter and exit the church do so in silence. At 7 p.m., we will have our traditional Good Friday service with the reading of the Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to John, the Veneration of the Cross and the singing of the hauntingly beautiful hymn, "Were You There?"

Easter Sunday, April 17 at 10 a.m.

Jesus Christ is risen today! Today is the day for bright colors, Easter lilies and butterflies...all things that celebrate new life. The service will begin with our butterfly procession celebrating our Lord's resurrection.

Some of those organizations coming up are Diocesan Summer Camp for our children grades 3 -9, the Episcopal Youth Event for our high school youth, Our Father’s House, a prom dinner for special needs students at WCHS, and scholarships for graduating seniors going to college.

On this day we move all the items to the Kosciusko County Fairgrounds. Most of the donated items are stored in the two outside buildings next to the church. Again the St. Anne’s Sale will take place in the Women’s Building located on the property of the Fairgrounds. The weather will not affect us, and we love having air-conditioning, restrooms, and a space for snacks for those working.

With that being said, we are beginning to solicit donations for the sale. If your family is conducting a spring cleaning SAMS will be happy to pick up your donations or feel free to drop them off at the church. (Please call the church to make arrangements with Carol.) We are always looking for large ticket items. Last year we had several large donations of both indoor and outdoor furniture and exercise equipment. Items that are donated can be taken as a tax deduction.

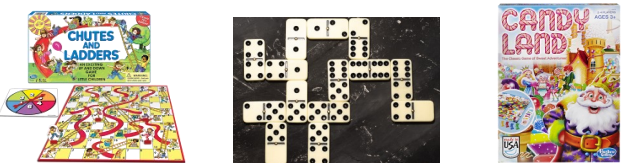
C.A.S.A Court Appointed Special Advocate
