Interim Priest-in-Charge Report

Thank you for your gracious and warm welcome, not only on the weekends when I served as Supply Priest this past summer, but also these last weeks of 2024, and the beginning weeks of 2025, when I began my new role in your midst as Interim Priest-in-Charge.

During my time as Supply Priest, I was impressed with St. Anne's food ministry: second Sunday sack lunches, assisting school students with "lunch money," the outdoor food pantry, and your new raised-bed vegetable gardens. Since I've been spending more time here in Warsaw, I've observed the critical impact of St. Anne's Pantry as it provides food goods to persons as needed.

I have appreciated the opportunities to visit members of St. Anne's in their homes and in local hospitals, sharing the sacraments of Anointing for healing and well-being as well as Holy Communion. As I've begun my new role, I'm meeting with church members at their requests as well as taking initiative to visit to St. Anne's members who are not able to attend St. Anne's in person for various reasons.

Following up with St. Anne's investment in the Congregational Assessment Tool (CAT) Report, representatives of both the Vestry and Search Committee have prepared an Executive Summary to be distributed and discussed at our Annual Meeting. We plan to have opportunity then to have small group conversations about recommendations that flow from this Report. One of the recommendations that the Vestry is taking action on already is to identify a consultant specializing in conflict transformation to work with us this year. The Vestry will have identified a conflict transformation consultant to work with all St. Anne's members to provide needed education/formation, and small group conversations among its members. This plan will help us to engage the conflicts and tensions we bear, and transform these dynamics into clearer senses for our ministries' direction and purposes.

With St. Anne's Vestry and its many ministries, we've begun to take seriously our Mission Statement: "Through the Holy Spirit, we invite all to share the Gospel, celebrate life, and serve the Lord in our neighborhood, community, and the world." In the months ahead, the Vestry will be focusing on articulating policies that help guide the ministries and ministers of St. Anne's to better enact this mission in all we say and do.

I look forward to continue this work with you in the months ahead. May God's Spirit, who has begun this good work in us, sustain us and bring this work to full fruit!

We made a \$500 donation to A Night to Shine and donated \$500 toward student lunch debt at Edgewood Middle School in February. We joined with SAMS and provided a meal for parishioners for Shrove Tuesday. In May, we gave a \$250 Scholarship to a Camp Mack camper.

June found us all busy setting up, pricing, and selling at our Annual Sale with SAMS. It was another successful year with our share of the proceeds being

Cheeseball and Outreach Income:

*Total Net Income from Cheeseball Sales (\$34,596) minus Expenses (\$16,191) came in at an incredible +\$18,405! As of this writing there are no Cheeseballs left to be sold! What an incredible effort! Thank you everyone for all of your hard work and dedication to this incredible ministry!

*Outreach Income for 2024 came in at **\$15,420!** The kindness and generosity of our St. Anne's Parish Family in support of local charities and ministries is truly extraordinary! Thank You!

Combined Total for Mission, Ministry and Outreach = \$33,825!! Which once again, better than doubled our 2024 budgeted charitable giving level!

Operating Expenses fell below budgeted levels for 2024 in Rector associated expenses, Background Checks, Postage, Telephone, Cell Phone, Computer, Utilities, Maintenance-Bldg & Ground, Cleaning Service, Music Program expense, Christian Education and Formation, Rector Search and Parish Life expense.

Expenses above budgeted levels were Admin. Health Ins (which was not budgeted), Office supplies and Printing, Cheeseball expense, Mission-Ministry-Outreach, Supply Priest, Worship Expense and Summer Camp.

The 2025 Operating Budget

The Finance Committee met in November to draft the 2025 Budget which was unanimously approved and submitted to the Vestry where it was unanimously approved with the following considerations:

*The Diocesan Assessment has been reduced from 15% to 14% again this year which will save St. Anne's approximately \$2,824.

*The Finance Committee recommended and the Vestry approved a 3% salary increase for staff members.

*Interim Priest expenses would be included in the Budget in account #6575 Supply Priest.

*The total for Pledge Offering Income would be kept open until just before the Annual Meeting. As of this writing, the Pledge Offering income for 2025 stands at \$125,900 which is a decrease of **(\$100,205 / 44.3%)** from the actual total of 2024 Pledge dollars received \$226,045.

TREASURER'S REPORT Good Morning and best wishes for a Safe and Happy 2025!

With continued steady growth in our economy, the generosity and support of our St. Anne's Parish Family coupled with significant reductions in our Operating Expenses, we finished 2024 in very good shape with these financial highlights... *Once again St. Anne's Parish Family significantly more than **DOUBLED** our 2024 budgeted Mission, Ministry and Outreach giving.

*Pledge and Plate Income has once again exceeded our budgeted level.

*After budgeting a budget shortfall for 2024, we finished the year with a **BUDGET SURPLUS** for the second year in a row.

*We opened a Money Market account in June of 2024 to set aside a portion of our General Operating Checking Account in order to earn a higher interest rate.

The 2024 BALANCE SHEET

In reviewing our 2024 Balance Sheet through December 31st, 2024 there are a couple of items of worthy note...

*Both our General Operating Checking Account and our Money Market Account are at a very good level as we begin the new year.

*The value of our investments held at State Street Global grew by over **9%**, reflecting the strong gains in the Stock Market in 2024.

The 2024 BUDGET REPORT

As we look at our 2024 Budget Report through December 31st, 2024 and remembering that this was a deficit budget, these are some of last year's financial highlights...

Pledge and Plate Income:

On a budget of \$209,212 our actual Pledge and Plate Income for 2024 came in at **\$234,179** an increase of **\$24,967** / **11.8%**. Thank you so much for your gen

\$4,736.16. This money allows us to support Outreach of the Month with a donation of \$100 for each and our other Ministries. In October we spent a evening packing meals for Feed My Starving Children and made a donation of \$1,000. This donation would provide food for 10 people for an entire year! We bought a cake to celebrate the Baptism of Adalynn Williamson in November. We also provided the Day to Day booklets a daily devotional for anyone wishing to take one located on the table in the narthex.

We were hoping to have an ECW Retreat this year but were unable to due to some scheduling conflicts. We are already in the beginning stages of planning a Retreat of relaxation and spiritual renewal for this Summer. Stay tuned for details.

We are looking forward to 2025 being a year of sharing our spiritual journeys together through fellowship and worship and continuing to do the work that we are all called to do. Hope you will join us!

FOOD MINISTRY

This was an exciting and successful year for the Food Ministries Programs implemented here at St. Anne's. The Beacon Food Pantry and the Raised Bed Gardens truly made an impact in our west end neighborhood, and we cannot thank you all enough for your support. We also paid down delinquent lunch accounts at Edgewood Middle School so children could eat and be better able to learn. And, at Christmas time, we supported the "Feed Them All" food program for low income families in Warsaw Schools by paying for boxes of food for two families who would otherwise go hungry over the holiday break. We were able to do this because of your generous gifts and others like them.

As you may recall, our neighborhood was designated by the Purdue Extension Office as a food desert, since it is over 2 miles to the closest grocery store for the residents here, west of Detroit street. This area of town is also fifty percent low income families, based on the number of households who qualify for free and reduced lunches at school, and the presence of the income based senior housing at Retired Tigers two blocks north of us on Main Street.

Thanks to your generous support of the Beacon 24 hour access food pantry, we have heard amazing stories from folks whose lives have been improved because they can put food on the table, and feel good about it. Single parents

feeding children, folks with a medical crisis waiting on disability to kick in, young parents of infants who had to move back in with a parent due to a job loss, and more. We are making a difference. We are feeding our neighbors. Thanks to your support.

Big thanks to Jimmy Bauman, Marc Vosler and Pam Vosler for assembling the raised garden beds for our fruit and vegetable garden that supplements the Beacon with fresh and nutritious produce all summer long. These beautiful cedar beds were crazy with peppers, squash, cucumbers, melons and tomatoes Dubbed the "Garden of Feedin", we produced hundreds of pounds of fresh, nutritious food for our neighbors who otherwise could not have afforded it. Several folks commented to us that our "tomatoes were the best they ever tasted!"

We also need to thank Mercedes Pratt and her daughters, Hazel, Sadie and Sophie, for their work tending to the vines, and installing the brick pavers in front of the swinging doors to allow better access for harvesting. And also for the sidewalk art that brightened up the area with a Welcome! Message.

We know that there are others who weeded, watered, harvested when we were not there to see you. But your work was seen, and appreciated. Thank you. We are looking forward to Spring and another great garden year. We need to increase pollinators, so additional flowers will feature in our plans.
